On Saturday evening, we have a fundraising **Charity Literary Trivia Night** in aid of the Northern Beaches Community Cancer Charity (NBCCC), with host **Murray Shaw** from the Nine Network and quizmaster **Kate Grant** of the Mackellar Girls' High School English Faculty.

Finally, on Sunday, we move our main venue from the Darley Smith Building on The Corso to the Manly Golf Club for a series of discussions on other aspects of Australian culture – music and sport – and culminating in **The Chairman's Lounge** experience with **Joe Aston** as our closing session.

Author Talk: Heather Morris

Heather Morris hails from a somewhat familiar New Zealand upbringing in a small rural community, part of a large family surrounded by several generations, excelling in sports, doing okay at school, and devouring information and stories. Heather indulged in her passion for writing with a scriptwriting course while raising a family and working as a social worker at a medical centre in Melbourne. Then, in 2003, she was introduced to Lale Sokolov, and the rest is history! It is a meeting that resulted in a screenplay and, secondly, in a book on Lale's story known as *The Tattooist of Auschwitz* (2018). She has since published three more Holocaust novels, and her latest book, *Sisters Under the Rising Sun* (2023), is set in a Japanese POW camp in Indonesia in World War II.

Heidi Coupland's husband, Peter, a grief counsellor, was diagnosed with leukaemia.

Anthony Sobb's wife, Kim, a solicitor with the DPP and a non-smoker, was diagnosed with stage 4 lung cancer.

Michelle Lesh's husband, Mark Raphael Baker, Associate Professor of Holocaust and Genocide Studies, wrote his memoir while dealing with pancreatic cancer.

Their respective memoirs, A Single Lifeline, My Business Is Now North and A Season of Death, share the story of diagnosis, treatment, fight for survival, their relationships, looking after children, acceptance, and the most personal of experiences for which there is no textbook—the grieving process.




Long Live The Romance Novel






A Culinary Odyssey X

Despite Australia's reputation for food as somewhat bland and dull before the wave of post-WW2 migration, these two books strongly argue that was not the case. **Lauren Samuelsson's** A Matter of Taste: The Australian Women's Weekly and Its Influence on Australian Food Culture shows that the magazine was highly influential in encouraging Australian women (yes, mostly women in the kitchen!) to be adventurous and to develop a uniquely Australian culinary culture.

Justice for Kathleen Folbigg 🔎

Kathleen Folbigg was wrongfully convicted in 2003 for the deaths of her four children. She was pardoned and her convictions overturned in 2023 after a long and unrelenting campaign for justice from a dedicated team of lawyers, friends and supporters. Quentin McDermott's book, Meadow's Law, meticulously examines the intersection of flawed legal principles and groundbreaking scientific discoveries that ultimately led to Kathleen's exoneration after two decades behind bars. Drawing from his extensive research and involvement in the case, McDermott sheds light on the pivotal role of investigative journalism in challenging miscarriages of justice. This session offers a profound exploration of the complexities within the legal system and the relentless pursuit of truth, for anyone interested in true crime, justice, science and the power of investigative journalism.

Changing Life


When Christine Newell pulled over to the side of the road in a dinosaur costume, sobbing her heart out, she knew it was time for a change. So she took a role with an experimental theatre company in Seoul, immersing herself in South Korean culture and shifting her mindset, resulting in Five Seasons in Seoul (released in March). Jo Peck found herself in the middle of a cliché when her husband of 35 years left her for a younger woman. Once she picked herself up and dusted herself off, she wrote an inspiring and funny memoir, Suddenly Single at Sixty, that takes us from shock and despair to a new life. For the 'Boomer' generation, which spawned the likes of The Beatles, Bob Dylan, Janis Joplin, The Beach Boys and the Rolling Stones, Carol **LeFevre** says that turning 70 was like an assault. You're constantly told your generation had it 'lucky' and ruined it for everyone else. In Bloomers, Carol explains that people aged 70+ are not at the end of things but are still on their way and fully intent on embracing late-life flourishing. Join us as we discuss their journeys of reinvention—whether through immersing themselves in a new culture, finding humour in heartbreak, or embracing the possibilities of later life.

Jane Caro is a Walkley Award-winning columnist, author, broadcaster, and social commentator. She has worked in marketing and advertising and has penned over 15 books across a range of genres, including novels, women's issues, religion, and memoirs. Her latest novel, Lyrebird, is based on the premise that lyrebirds are exceptional mimics. So, when one emits the sound of a woman screaming in terror and pleading for her life, how do a young PhD student and an inexperienced detective convince anyone that the bird witnessed a murder without an actual missing person, let alone a body? In her latest thriller, released on April 1st, Jane highlights injustices faced by marginalised women.

Bipolar Journeys: Stories Of Strength, Struggle, And Self-Discovery

Amanda Goff (Misfit), a journalist, has written two previous memoirs, but this is the first as herself, Amanda. She was diagnosed with bipolar at age 48 after having spent the previous ten years as a highprofile escort. Sarah Martin (Dear Psychosis) writes of her daughter suffering a psychotic episode while travelling in Turkey, a subsequent diagnosis of bipolar, and the confronting impact on her family. Jacqui Louise Swallow (The Bipolar Runner) navigated school and university despite a troubled teenage and, as a young mum, realised that keeping active helped her manage bipolar better than anything and set herself a goal of running the Melbourne Marathon.




Historical Fiction Beyond The Border

In a break from the generally Anglo-centric historical novel, **Emily Maguire's** Rapture brings us the deeply devout 18-year-old Agnes from Mainz in Germany who, with the help of a lovesick Benedictine monk, disguises herself and becomes a matchless scholar and teacher, John the Englishman who is celebrated from Athens to Rome. In *Ring of Ruse*, **James Vella-Bardon** brings *The Sassana Stone* pentalogy to a close when the protagonist 'Santi' (a survivor of the Spanish Armada shipwreck in Ireland) takes part in the Battle for Gaelic Connacht, which was met by England's most significant force at the time. Both are stories of self-determination, courage, and faith, drawing on history, legend, and imagination.








Journalist, sports commentator, Wallabies lock, and acclaimed author of more than 40 works of non-fiction, Peter FitzSimon's latest book The Legend of Albert Jacka: From the brutal shores of Gallipoli to the battlefields of France, charts the epic story of the first Australian soldier to be awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions at Gallipoli in 1915. A national hero, Jacka moved on to France, where he earned the Military Cross at Pozieres and battled at Bullecourt, eventually coming home after a sniper's bullet and gassing at Villers-Bretonneux.






True Crime: Tales Of Betrayal, Escape And Justice P

Step into the world of true crime with Michael Adams and Rebecca Hazel, as they explore two extraordinary stories of betrayal, escape, and the pursuit of justice. Michael's second true crime book, They'll Never Hold Me, deals with the case of Kevin John Simmonds, who established himself as an anti-hero to many following a never-beforeaccomplished escape from Long Bay Gaol, and despite being accused of the murder of a prison warden. He led seven carloads of police and tracker dogs on a chase for more than five weeks until he was eventually re-captured. Rebecca is a lawyer who got talking to a colleague at a women's refuge in Manly in 2007, who confided to her that she thought her ex-husband, Chris Dawson, had murdered his first wife, Lynette. With the woman we now know as 'JC' as her initial source, Rebecca's book, The Schoolgirl, Her Teacher, and His Wife, recounts the story of Dawson's behaviour in plain sight for more than 40 years with meticulous care and rich research.

When French President Emmanuel Macron spoke those words in response to a question about Australia's cancelled submarine deal with France, it was clear that the fallout from the decision was nuclear in more ways than one. Author **Andrew Fowler** reveals what drove Australia to shift from France to its traditional allies, the USA and UK, in signing the AUKUS deal. By interviewing sources in Paris, London, Washington, and Canberra, Fowler assembles the narrative that led to Australia choosing a nuclear-powered US submarine, which some experts believe seriously jeopardises Australia's ability to defend itself. Nuked—The Submarine Fiasco that Sank Australia's Sovereignty won the 2024 Walkley Book Award.

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


Reflections: Dispossession Of Your Land


Breaking the Mould: Women, Medicine, and the Power of Storytelling 69

Made In India 🍪

The Indian diaspora in Australia is one of the country's fastest-growing and most vibrant and diverse cultural groups. According to recent Australian Bureau of Statistics data, more than 700,000 Australians identify as having Indian ancestry, many of whom are first-generation migrants. Growing Up Indian in Australia, compiled by Aarti Betigeri, is a heartfelt, reflective account of navigating two worlds: the rich traditions of Indian heritage and contemporary Australian life. Betigeri and her contributors, including Manly local Sharon Verghis, capture the joys, struggles, and humour of straddling two worlds, also captured by the tales of Deep Gujral (Manjits and the Tandoor of Secrets) through his experience as a Sikh child at one of Sydney's most conservative private boys' schools to an event and restaurant enterprise catering largely, but not exclusively, to the Australian Indian community.

Rivals In The Storm: War, Peace And The Price Of Leadership 🍑 🏛

Elected to the House of Commons in 1890 as a 27-year-old, David Lloyd George was audacious, charming, witty, energetic and a good debater. A Welshman who grew up in poverty, he was from the 'wrong side of the tracks' compared with parliamentarians of the day and demonstrated a profound empathy for those for whom class denied opportunities. On the one hand, history has judged him as an early appeaser of Germany before World War I and a Prime Minister (1916-1922) who made several unforced strategic errors. On the other hand, he is seen as the Prime Minister who won the Great War and as having an intuitive reading of geopolitical issues. He saw the need - at least in the short term - for 'a special relationship' with the United States; he foreshadowed another world war after the many compromises implicit in the Treaty of Versailles even though he was one of its architects; and closer to home led negotiations that culminated in an independent Ireland. We talk with former Conservative MP Damian Collins, the author of Rivals in the Storm: How David Lloyd George Won the War and Lost his Government.

Australian Historical Fiction

We discuss Australian historical stories from 18th century England to World War II with three authors. Free by **Meg Keneally** blends storytelling with social critique in the story of Molly Thistle, who is transported to the new penal colony after stealing a horse and defies convention to create a commercial empire.
